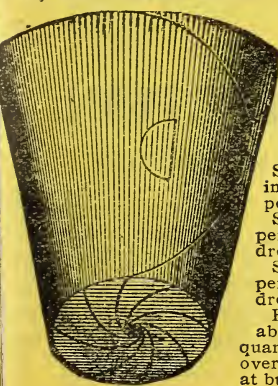
I receive a number of orders every year that I am unable to forward, as some part or all of the address is omitted, and the post mark is often illegible.

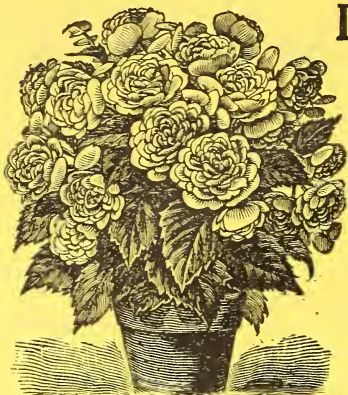

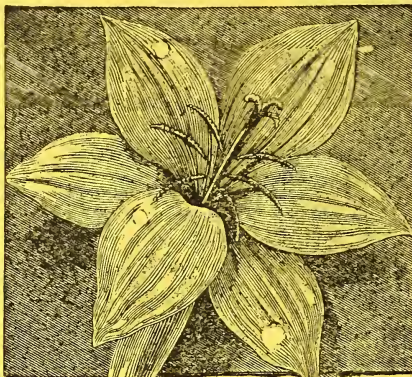

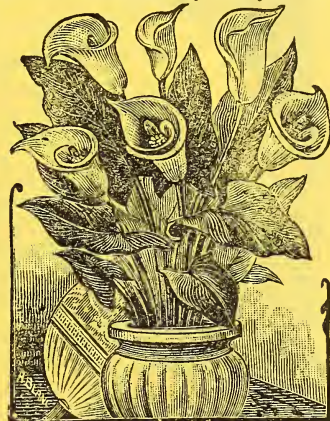

The center is lovely, the anthers are a delicate lemon yellow. The pistil is curiously carved, and usually covered with honeydew. The fragrance is delightful. Place a stalk in water and the flowers will all open. We have seen eleven stalks shoot up successively from one bulb. The bulbs will flower profusely with great certainty.

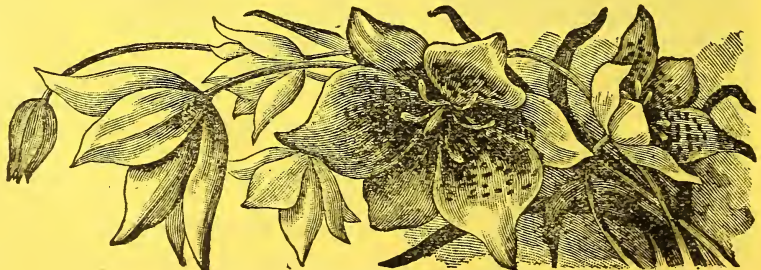

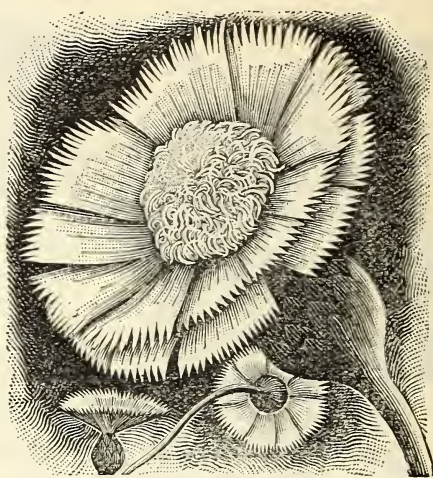

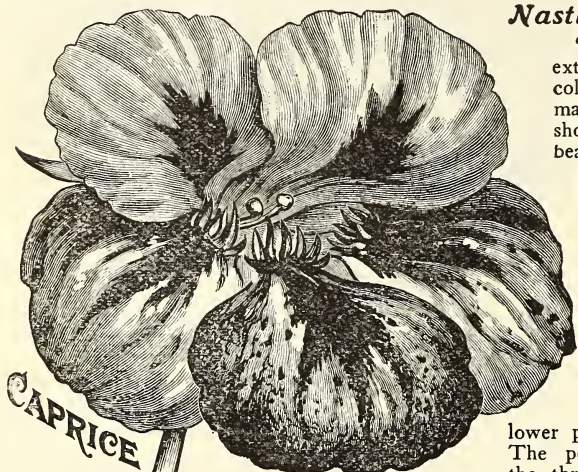

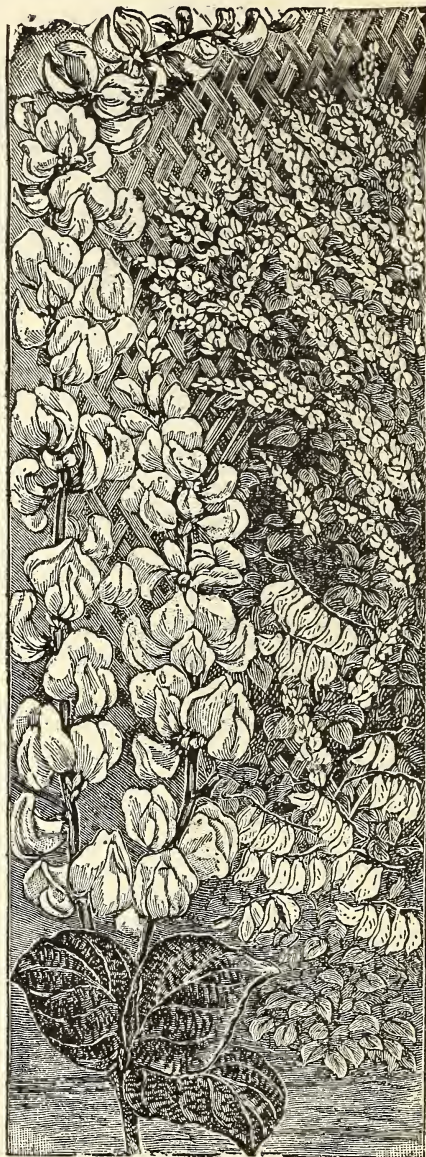

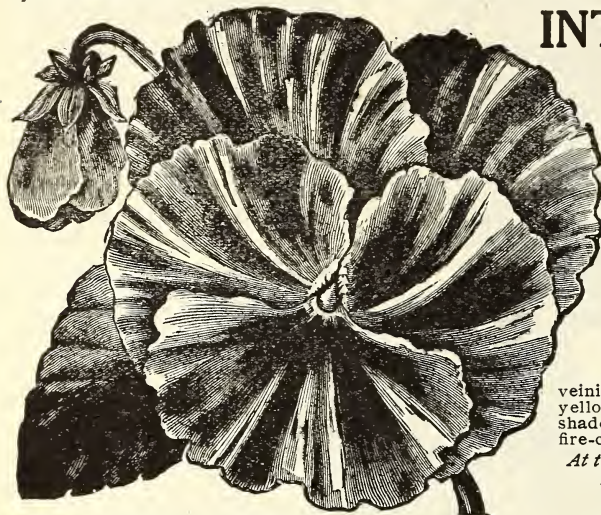

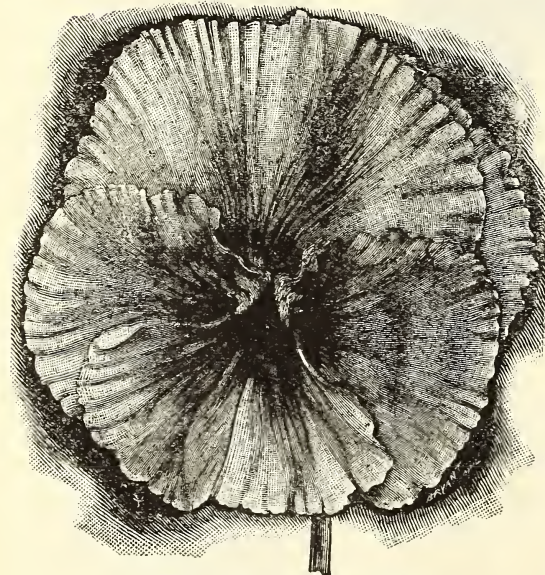

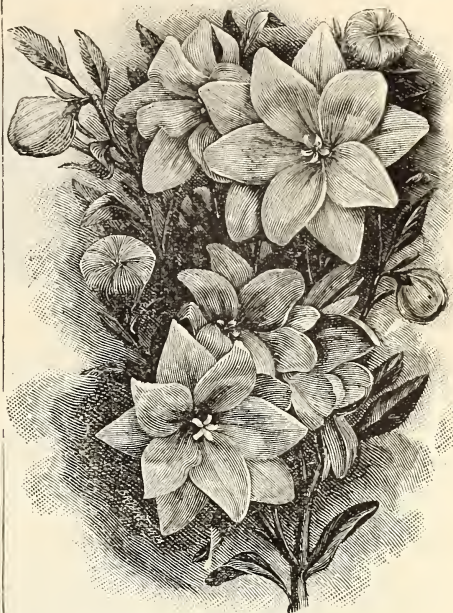
