The Jackson & Perkins Rose and Perennial Test Garden, started in the spring of 1930, contains five plants each of standard commercial varieties and several hundred undissemated seedlings from our own Research Department and from European hybridizers. These kinds are being grown under actual garden conditions. We are testing a great many new seedlings from some 29 European Rose-growers with whom we have contracts. New varieties of perennials are also under observation. This photograph was taken July 15, 1932. The trade and the public are cordially invited to visit this garden.

EACH year, Roses become more important in the nursery trade. Popular knowledge of Roses has increased steadily to the point where the older varieties no longer dominate the field.
