Remarks to Purchasers

READ CAREFULLY BEFORE ORDERING

Name and Address. Write your Name, Post Office, County and State as distinctly as possible. Some orders reach us which give neither name nor location. In such cases it is impossible for us to fill orders until we again hear from the senders.

Use the Order Sheet. Make out your list of requirements consecutively in the order as given in the Catalogue, placing the quantity wanted before the article, and the price of the same in the column to the right; and always keep a copy of your orders.

Correspondence should not be intermingled with the body of the order, but written either at the bottom of the Order Sheet or on a separate sheet of paper.

Remittances. The safest method of sending money is by Post-Office Orders. Where they are not obtainable, it can be sent by Express Money Orders, Registered Letter, or Draft on New York. For small amounts, postage stamps will be acceptable.

When the Remittance is not sufficient to pay for the quantity of seeds ordered, we will reduce the quantity to correspond with the remittance.

Errors. All possible precautions are taken to avoid their occurrence. Notify us at once if your order is not properly filled, and we will promptly make the necessary corrections.



Substitutions. As the season advances some stocks of seeds are exhausted, so it is advisable when late orders are sent to name a few substitutes. We make substitution only when requested to do so, sending varieties that will as fully cover the indicated wants as our stock will permit. If not so instructed, the remittance will be refunded.

Send us Your Order as Early as Possible. It will facilitate its prompt execution, and you will have your seed when you are ready to plant.

Parcel Post. Seeds and bulbs can now be sent by parcel post at the same rates as general merchandise. See inclosed table of parcel-post rates for all zones.

Seeds by Express. Seeds can now be forwarded at 20 per cent less than merchandise rates; a saving to the buyer of one-fifth over previous rates.

Shipments by Freight. Seeds in bulk, implements and other heavy goods are shipped by freight, and unless there is a freight agent at point of destination, the freight must be prepaid, the purchaser advancing the same, unless otherwise arranged. Our facilities for shipping to points south of Pittsburgh on the Ohio River and connecting streams are excellent, steamers plying daily between this and southern points.

Catalogues are sent free to all our customers of the past year. Should any change their place of residence, we desire to be informed, that we may correct the address in our Catalogue list. Our local customers, who purchase over our counters, will please give their correct address when making their first annual purchase; this will insure their receiving Catalogues the following year by mail. Many of our patrons who desire our Catalogues fail to receive them because their post-office address is unknown to us.

Success means work

Some vegetables, such as Beans of all kinds, Tomatoes, etc., as well as Sweet Peas, require considerable space, on account of the large amount of foliage, and also require a longer time to mature. Other vegetables, such as Onions, Radishes and Lettuce have very little foliage and develop much more quickly. These were planted between the rows of the slow-growing vegetables, and when matured and removed there remained plenty of room for the others.

Some plants such as Lettuce, Beets, Tomatoes and Kohlrabi are easily transplanted and are benefited by it. The ideal time to do this is immediately following a rainfall or during cloudy weather. Yet if care is used a fair degree of success will attend one's effort under less favorable conditions. Remove plenty of earth with the plants and if they do not separate easily immerse the roots for a few minutes in water. They should then be set out as quickly as possible and watered freely.

Remember that most plants grow from the bud or center and even if the outer leaves appear wilted they will continue to grow. It is even advisable, particularly with Beets, to pinch off most of the outer foliage and even a portion of the roots; this will permit the plants to grow more freely.

The method of hoeing, as was practised by farmers a score of years ago, is unnecessary. Keep the ground as level as possible so as to retain the rainfall. With a narrow hoe keep the weeds cut down. The only cultivation necessary

is to loosen the soil occasionally to a depth of an inch or two; this will create a mulch about the roots of the plants and will retard evaporation.

Should bugs or insects become troublesome, immediately apply an insecticide; arsenate of lead may be used with good results. Two or three applications will usually be sufficient.

In choosing the vegetables adopted for a second crop, because they grow quickly, one should be governed by the season. Beans can be grown successfully any time after danger of frost is past; Radishes, Lettuce and Onions can be grown successfully only either in the early or late summer.

Lettuce is no doubt the most profitable crop in a small garden. The seed costs so little, it can be planted very early, requires little space, grows quickly and is much in demand. Onions grown from sets are almost equally profitable.

Sweet Peas were grown the first few seasons for our own use only, but the past two or three years we grew more than we required, and it was surprising how readily they were sold and how well they paid.

When the Sweet Peas are only an inch or two high, provision should be made for them to vine or climb. I have found nothing better than string for this purpose. Wire, if used, will become very hot during the warm summer days and cause the vines to wilt.

In any residential section, an ambitious boy can easily sell all the vege-

tables that can be grown in an ordinary garden. If he can be depended upon to call regularly, with vegetables absolutely fresh and clean, he can establish a line of customers who will welcome and pay him the regular market prices, which are usually fair.

BEANS

(Bohnen)

Bean crop largely a failure

Beans should not be planted before the ground becomes light and warm, in favorable seasons usually about the first of May. The soil should be rich and mellow, and the seeds scattered about 3 inches apart in drills 2 to 2 1/2 feet apart and covered about 2 inches deep. Successive sowings, made at intervals of about two weeks until the middle of July, will give a plentiful supply of Beans throughout the season. One quart of seed will sow 100 feet of drill.

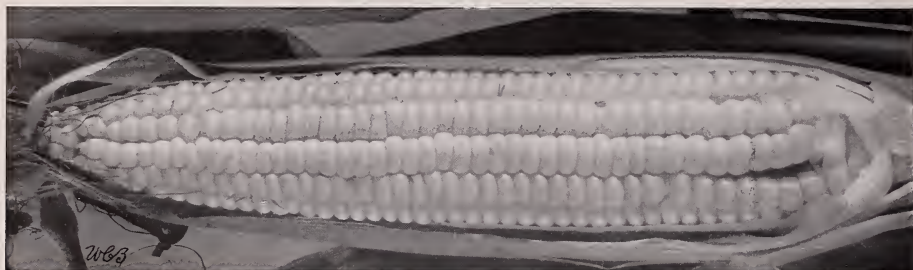

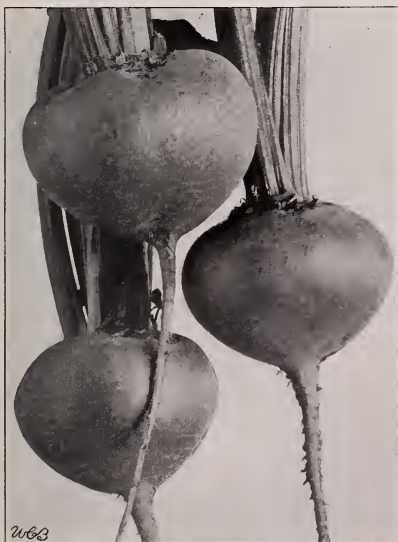

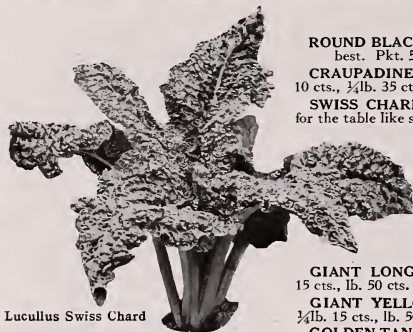

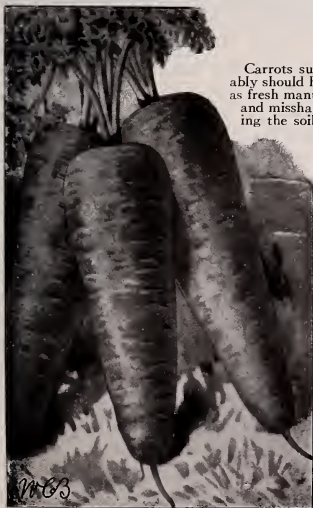

CELERY (Sellerie)

Celery can be grown in any garden soil, but the finest is produced in deep, mellow bottom land. Seed for early crops should be sown in hotbeds about March 15. The plants may be either thinned to give them room to grow, or transplanted to another bed to grow until it is time to plant them in the open ground. For main crop, seed should be sown in the open air as soon as the soil and air are warm enough. They should be covered lightly, or merely pressed into the earth with a board, if the soil is fine and mellow. The seed-bed must be kept free from weeds, and well watered in dry weather. When the plants are large enough, transplant them to shallow trenches or furrows, from 4 to 6 feet apart, according to the variety grown, setting the plants 6 inches apart in the rows and pressing the soil firmly around them. Blanching consists of drawing earth up to the stalks at intervals of about two weeks, until all but the tops of the plants are covered. Celery may be kept for winter use in pots or cellars, or in deep, narrow trenches, in a dry situation; the latter must be covered with boards, with sufficient soil and manure on top to keep out the frost, leaving openings at short distances for ventilation in mild weather. An ounce of seed will produce about 2,000 plants.

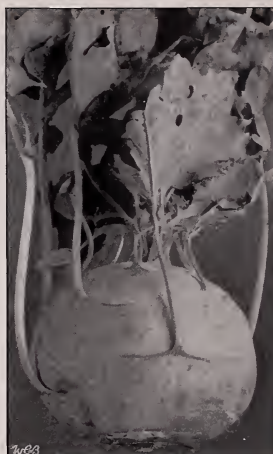

All possible protection should be given the young plants, and, as a protection from insects, use dry ashes or coal-dust sprinkled over the leaves. Plant the seeds thickly, and thin the plants to four of the strongest in each hill. An ounce of seed will plant about 50 hills.

Explanation of Abbreviations Used in the Descriptions

HARDY ANNUALS, HA. These should be sown outside in April or May, according to season, latitude and condition of soil; or, they may be sown at a somewhat earlier date in a hotbed or greenhouse, the combining of the two methods being advisable, thereby providing for a succession of plantings if both sowings prosper. Seed sown under glass will also produce earlier-blooming plants than seed sown outdoors. The soil should be rather light and rich, and for outdoor sowing it must be thoroughly dug up, well raked and leveled. The coarser seeds are to be covered to once or twice their thickness, while very fine seeds are to be merely pressed into the soil. All sowing should be firm with a board or the hand, as this hastens the germination of the seed as well as promoting its regularity. For indoor sowing, use shallow boxes of several inches in depth, and of a size to suit. Careful attention is required as soon as the seed is sprouted that seedlings may not suffer for lack of moisture, and of air if grown indoors.

HALF-HARDY ANNUALS, HHA, HALF-HARDY BIENNIALS, HHB, and HALF-HARDY PERENNIALS, HHP. These may be sown indoors, as above directed, from March to May, and outdoors after the middle of May. Many of the Biennials and Perennials will bloom the first season if sown early.

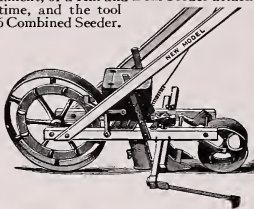

For a Fine Lawn Use Our Evergreen Lawn Seed



GOOD soil and proper drainage are absolutely necessary to produce a good lawn. There should be no less than a foot of good surface or sandy soil,—heavy loam where possible. In light or sandy soil the grass has a tendency to burn out in hot, dry weather. Where it is necessary to grade the surface, the subsoil should be removed and replaced with good earth.

Unless the soil is sufficiently rich, apply a liberal quantity of well-rotted manure, dig or plow this in and incorporate with the soil. Rake or harrow the surface even, and after sowing the seed rake again lightly and firm the soil with a lawnmower. Never attempt to dig, rake or roll a lawn when the ground is wet.

The best time to make a lawn is early in spring as soon as the ground is in good tillable condition, although very satisfactory results are obtained from lawns made during the summer and autumn.

When the young grass is from 3 to 4 inches high, it should be mown, but not too short, as close cropping is injurious to a new lawn. Repeat the mowing at intervals of about ten days. After the lawn is once well established, frequent rollings are beneficial, especially early in spring, after the soil and with it the roots of the grass have been drawn up by the winter's frost.

On banks and terraces, where the seed is liable to be washed off by rains before it has sprouted, a quick catch can be secured by mixing the seed with moist earth about one week before sowing; at the expiration of that time much of the seed is ready to sprout.
