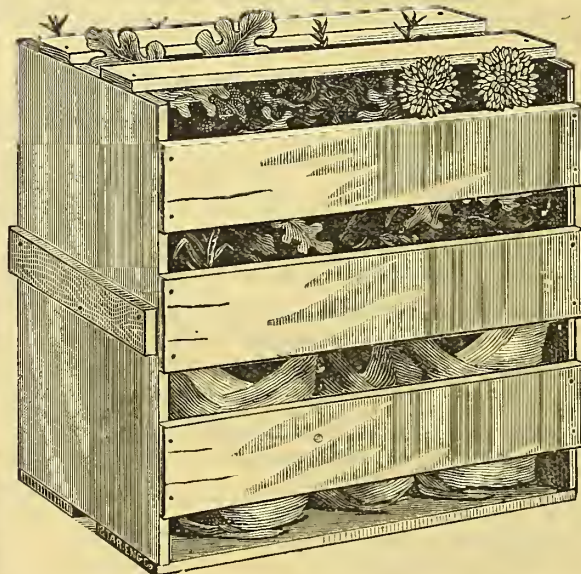

PACKING is executed with great care, everything being carefully labeled.

We make no charge for boxing or packing.

No charge for delivering to any freight depot, express office or wharf in St. Louis.

Your Name.—Most people write their name hurriedly, while the names of the articles wanted are written with care. Please remember we are perfectly familiar with the names of all our goods, and can read them when poorly written, but we do not know your name, and if poorly written, we must guess at it, which if not correct, may cause much delay and even the entire loss of goods. Therefore write your name plainly.

Important Items

WE GUARANTEE that all seeds, plants or other goods shall reach our customers safely and in good condition. Examine carefully on receipt and report at once should there be any cause for complaint.

HOW TO ORDER. Please use order sheets found in front part of every catalogue, carefully filling out blank spaces at top for shipping directions. Be sure to sign your name and give post-office and state. To avoid mistakes, do not write letters on same sheet as orders.

WHEN TO ORDER. We are prepared to fill orders as soon as this catalogue reaches you. Send in your combined orders for seeds, trees and plants, and if you do not wish trees and plants sent until time to plant in your locality, will send seeds at once and balance of order later. If you want part or all of order held, state it distinctly with date when shipment is to be made.

POSTPAID BY MAIL. We deliver postpaid to any Post Office in the United States any article in this Catalogue offered by mail.

BY EXPRESS OR FREIGHT. Means that we deliver the stock to express or railroad here, and the purchaser pays all transportation charges on receipt of goods. No charge for packages.

EXPRESS RATES. Plants, Seeds and Trees are now taken by the Express Companies at a reduction of 20 per cent from regular rates for merchandise. When distance is not too great it is best to order by express—stronger stock in better condition can be sent.

HOW TO SEND MONEY. The safest and most convenient and by far the cheapest method of sending money is by Post Office Money Orders, and nearly all Post Offices issue them. The fee on a Money Order is only 3 or 5 cents for small sums. Money can also be sent by Express Company's Money Orders, Bank Drafts, Bills or Coin by Registered Letter.

We will pay expense of forwarding money by either of the above ways, and you may deduct the cost from the amount of the Money Order sent.

STAMPS. We will accept stamps for very small amounts only, but since we offer to meet the expenses of sending money by the above four ways, we trust you will not send stamps, unless absolutely necessary, as they will be at your risk.

Customers visiting the city and intending to purchase Plants from us to take home with them should send us their orders by mail a day or two before, and we will have the plants packed ready for them at the Store when they call.

A WORD REGARDING OUR NOVELTIES.

The following sixteen pages contain a list of meritorious new vegetable and flower seeds and also such old varieties as we deem worthy of special notice. Many we have introduced ourselves, others we have obtained from good sources; all are good. Everything we find on trial to be better than or distinct from other sorts we aim to catalog and the varieties we sell are to be relied upon—all fresh seeds.

ASPARACUS.

Bonvallets Giant. This is one of the best varieties for home or market use. It is a very quick yielding sort. The shoots are purplish in color, much preferred over lighter green or whitish grass when planted deep and cut white; the immense stalks possess a superb flavor. Per pkt. 10c.

Snowhead. A very fine new variety, stalks pure white, free from rust, an early variety and a heavy yielder. Per pkt. 10c.

BEEF.

Columbia. A superb early main crop beet, suitable for either market or the home garden. The roots are neat turnip shaped flesh deep red, tender and of delicious flavor. Per pkt. 5c.

Wibolt's Half Long Blood. The bulb of this variety is tender and of fine quality, rich color, and is entirely free from roughness; fine variety for slicing; Per pkt. 10c; oz. 15c; ¼ lb. 30c.

CARROT.

IMPROVED RUBICON—This is a beautiful half long stump root carrot originated in Rhode Island. The shape and color is most desirable. They grow about the same size as Danvers but thicker and are a rich orange in color. Per pkt. 5c.

LONG CARENTAN—An excellent Scarlet variety without core, for forcing or the open ground, tops very small, roots cylindrical with very small neck. Per pkt. 10c.

EARLY GEM—It is smooth and the flesh very close in texture. An excellent keeper and of fine flavor. Per pkt. 10c; oz. 25.

NEW EARLY SHORT HORN—It is small redish orange of globular shape, an excellent keeper and of fine flavor. Per pkt. 5c; oz. 25c; ¼ lb. 75c.

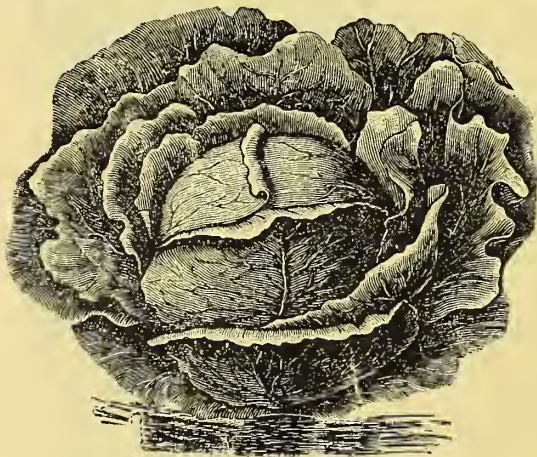
GOLDEN ROD—This is a half long stump rooted variety, somewhat deeper in color and a heavier cropper than Danvers. Pkt. 10c; oz. 25c; ¼ lb. 75c.

GIANT INTERMEDIATE—This variety is uniform in shape, and where the soil is favorable it will grow clean without any side roots. For table use it is unexcelled and yields abundantly. Per pkt. 10c; oz. 25c; ¼ lb. 75c.

CABBAGE.

RED OTHELLO—This variety has all the good qualities of the Brunswick, being of great size which exceeds by far that of all known varieties of red cabbage. It is round forming a smooth flat head, very firm and is an excellent keeper. Per pkt. 10c.

DANISH DEFIANCE—A new variety, strong and hardy grower, producing a good crop, heads large and round uniform size with but few outer leaves. Per pkt. 10c.

EGG PLANT.

SCARLET CHAMELEON—An interesting variety producing medium-sized flat fruits, which when ripening are white at first, changing gradually into yellow and turning to brilliant scarlet at last. Per pkt. 10c.

JAPANESE MONSTER—This novel variety originated in Japan. The fruit is of enormous size, absolutely perfect shape and the color a dense black resembling the noted black Pekin, over which it is a great improvement. SILVERHEART—Distinct new variety with finely lacinated moss curled leaves of a light yellow color turning almost to white. Stalks and ribs nearly white. Per pkt. 5c.

Its crisp leaves give it a very particular look, the heart is very full, and it blanches easily without being tied up. CUCUMBERS.

FÜRST BULOW—A new forcing cucumber produces medium sized very fleshy fruits of fine flavor, vigorous grower recommended highly for forcing. Per pkt. 10c.

NEW DAVIS—This variety has no equal. Its excellent eating qualities, shape, color and productiveness places it without a rival. It is a very vigorous grower and should not be planted too close together. It has very few seeds, which makes it preferable to any other sort for the table. It is a grand variety for either market or the home garden. (See illustration). Per pkt. 10c.

LEMON—A new and distinct type, tender and sweet, nearly round, with the yellow and green markings and smooth skin of the lemon, while the flesh is exceedingly tender and crisp with a flavor surpassing all other cucumbers. It is one of the best for pickling, size 2 1/4 to 3 inches in diameter. Per pkt. 5c; oz. 10c.

EXCELSIOR—An excellent and free bearing variety, light green color, white spined, 10 to 14 inches in length, fairly early, contains little seed, firm and juicy flesh, of excellent flavor, good for salads and for pickling. Per pkt. 10c.

WHITE MEXICAN—Many are acquainted with the delicious flavor of the Black Mexican sweet corn, but the objection has always been the color. In the White Mexican this has been eliminated, while all the good qualities of the old dark type remain. It is a very early variety, coming in with Cory or a little bit before, and is a better yielder. The plant is from four to five feet high, vigorous and healthy. The ears in size and shape resemble the Black Mexican. Per pkt. 10c; pint 20c; qt. 35c.

MASON'S FAVORITE—The ears are of large size, very tender and of delicious, rich flavor. The plants are luxuriant, healthy growers and are scarcely affected by drought and are wonderfully prolific. Per pkt. 10c; pt. 20c; qt. 35c.

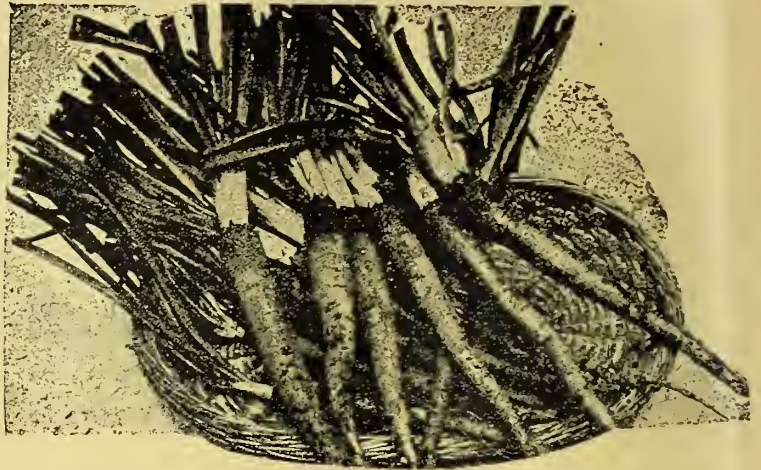

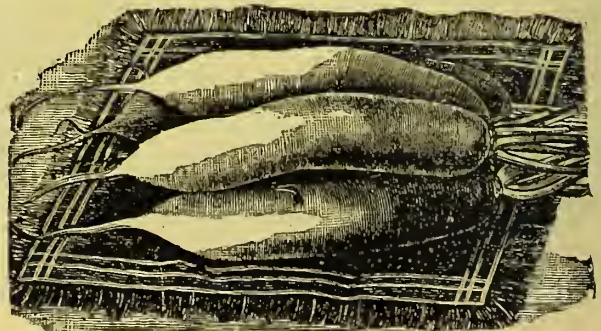

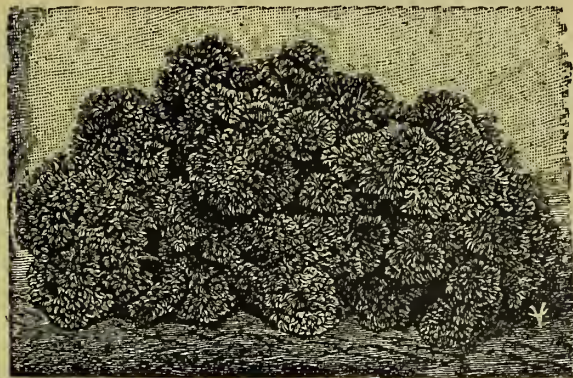

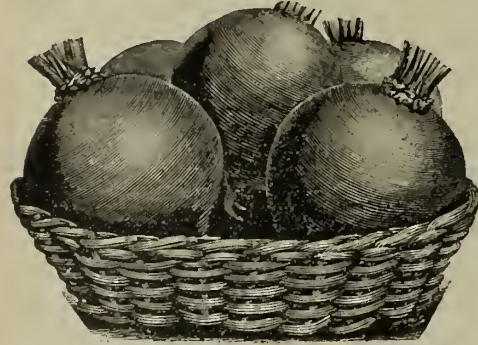

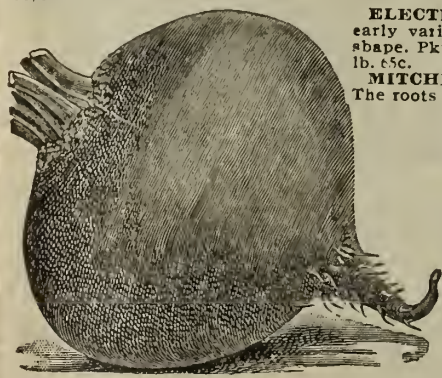

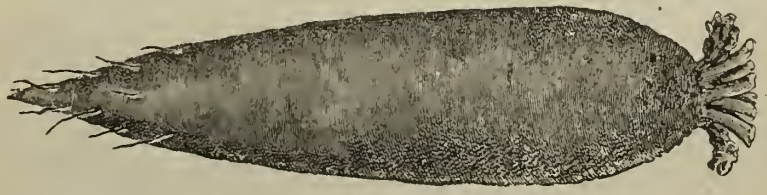

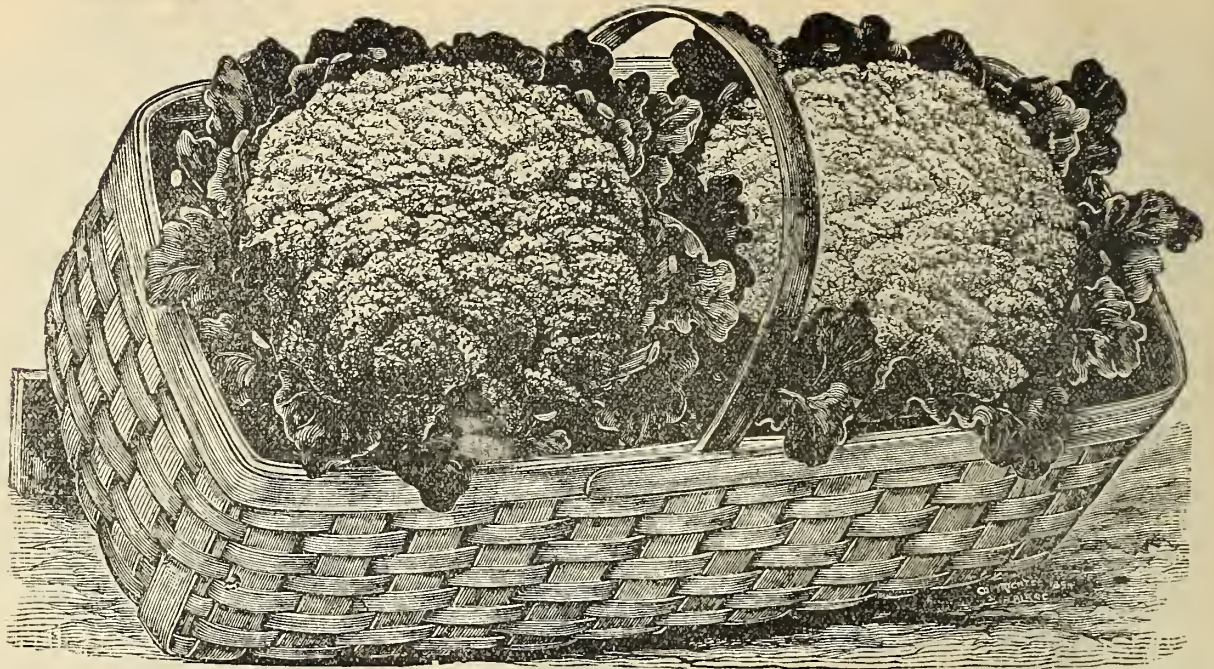

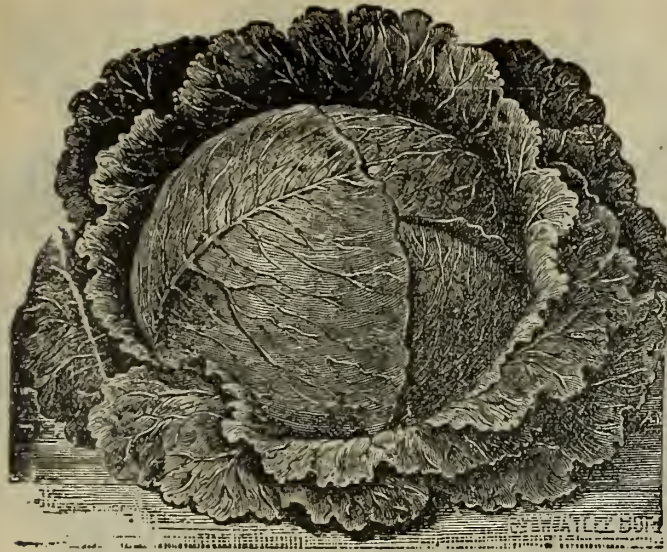

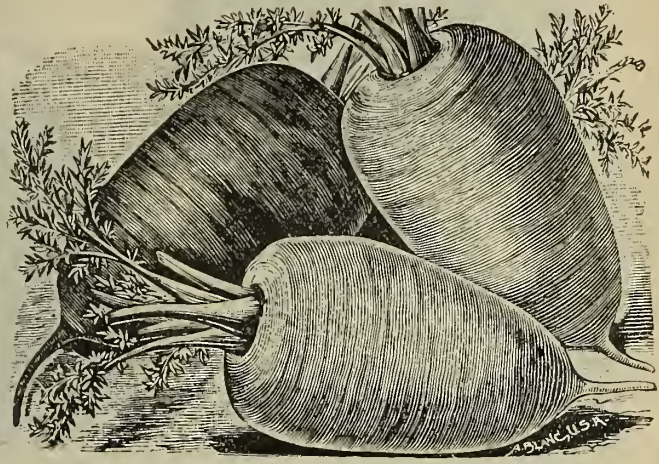

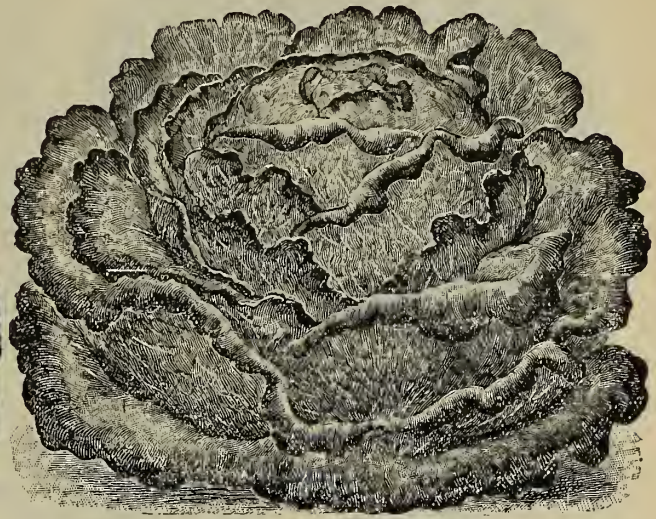


Kohl-Rabi, White Vienna.

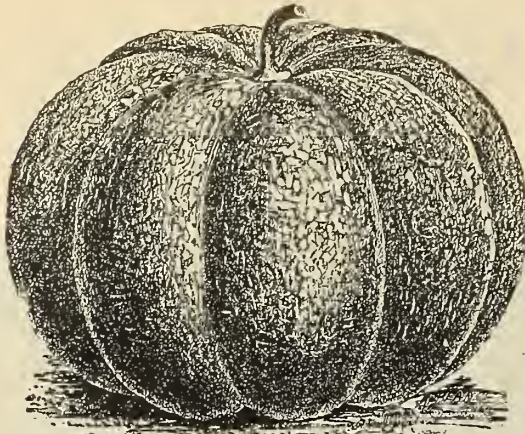

Sweet, Pot or Medicinal Herbs.

No garden is complete without a few herbs for culinary or medicinal purposes, and care should be taken to harvest them properly. This should be done on a dry day, just before they come into full bloom, then dried quickly and packed closely, entirely excluded from the air. Sow in the spring, in shallow drills one foot apart, and when well up, thin out or transplant to a proper distance apart.

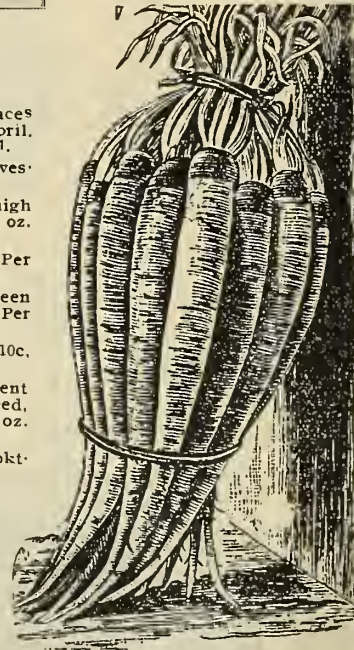

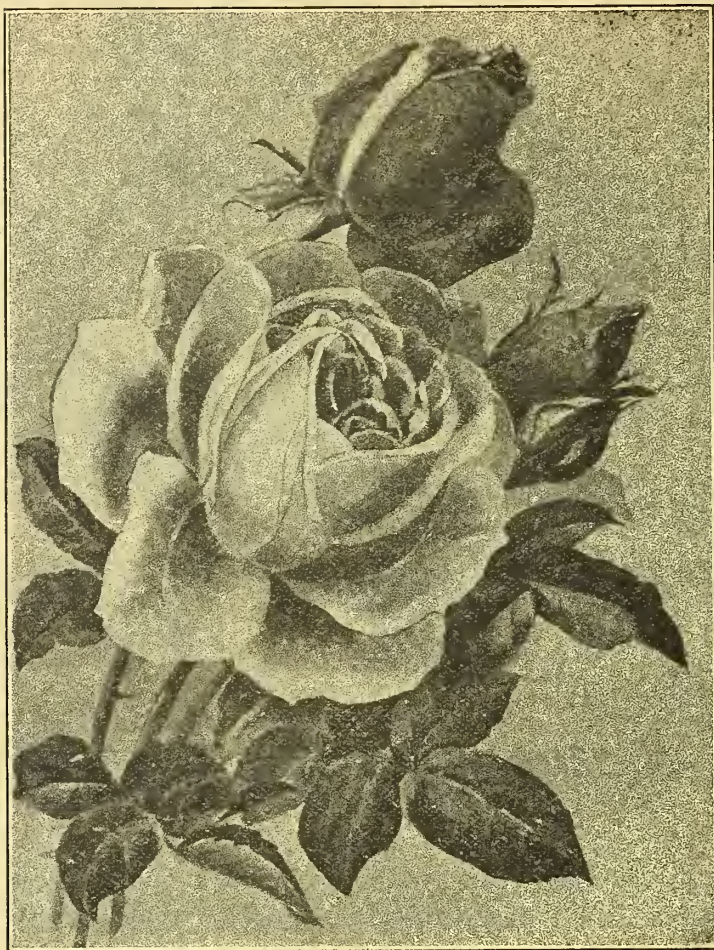

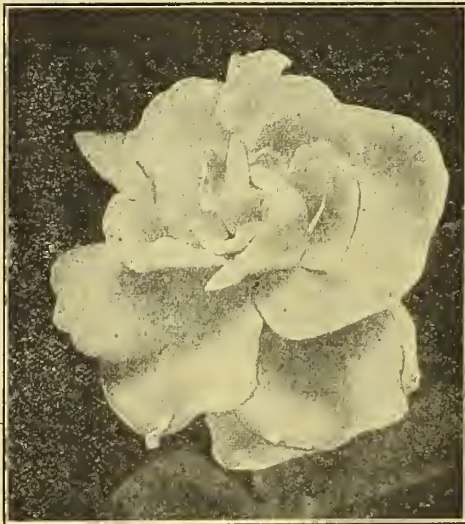

The rose is undoubtedly the most appreciated of all flowers, and no garden is complete without at least one bed of roses. To have success with roses always plant them in a bed devoted to roses alone; they will not only do better, but the effect is much better than when they are mixed with other plants. Always select a location where they will have plenty of sunlight and never plant under or too near trees or large shrubbery. The growing of roses is one of our leading specialties. We pay particular attention to the growing of extra large plants, and we offer all of the best hardy varieties in large field-grown plants and the more tender varieties in fine two-year-old stock. We grow everything on their own roots, with the exception of a very few varieties which thrive only in budded stock.

THREE SIZES.

We grow our roses in *three* sizes. This gives purchasers the opportunity of procuring a plant of large size, which will make a show at once, or smaller plants at prices which place them within the reach of all. Our roses are graded as follows: First size are usually 15 to 20 inches high and branched; second size, 10 to 15 inches, and third size, 5 to 10 inches.

HOW TO GROW ROSES.

WHAT VARIETIES TO PLANT.—The Ever-Blooming or Monthly Roses are the only really constant bloomers we have. They begin to bloom early in May, and continue all through the summer and autumn months until stopped by freezing weather.

HARDY ROSES.—This section embraces the Hybrid Perpetuals, the Hardy Climbers, the Hardy Rambler group, the Memorial Rose and its hybrids, the Rugosas and various miscellaneous types that have proven their hardiness and adaptability for permanent outdoor decoration in the colder parts of the temperate zone.

EVERBLOOMING CLIMBING ROSES.—As free-blooming as the ordinary Tea Roses, and of a strong, vigorous climbing habit. In the South, where they stand the winters, nothing can compare with them for beauty of foliage and flowers. They may be kept out of doors in the North by laying them down and covering well with leaves or litter.

PREPARATION OF ROSE-BED.—Select a sunny spot, prepare your bed by digging to the depth of eighteen inches. Any good garden mould will grow roses. After the plants have been set out, which should be early in the season, keep the soil loose by frequent shallow stirrings till the middle of June, when they should be mulched by covering the surface of the bed to a depth of an inch or so with old manure to prevent evaporation.

FERTILIZERS.—Fine, well-decomposed cow manure is the best for general purposes, and the results obtained from its use will be found to be in most respects satisfactory. Ground bone ranks next to cow manure as a fertilizer.

WINTER PROTECTION.—The ever-blooming roses require protection during the winter. A good way of protecting them is to bend the bush down and cover to the depth of three or four inches with loose earth; over this put a light covering of boards or boughs. Any mode of protection is good that will prevent sudden freezing and thawing, and does not hold moisture about the stem, causing decay. A straw covering is apt to harbor mice. *Do not cover too soon*; wait until the plants are well matured and severe weather is beginning; light freezing will do no harm. *Uncover* when the frost is leaving the ground.

INSECTS.—The most important is the Rose-Slug, a green, soft, slug-like animal, about a quarter of an inch long, most troublesome in June; they feed upon the upper surface of the leaf. A good remedy is white Hellebore Powder, mixed in water and put on with a syringe; or dusted with Young's Insect Powder. To destroy Aphis or Green Fly, dust with Young's Insect Powder, or place tobacco stems on the ground around the rose.

MILDEW.—This disease is caused by the sudden changes from heat to cold. Remedy: Dust with sulphur as soon as it appears.

FREE INSTRUCTIONS.—We will send, free of charge, to any one ordering Roses who applies for same, our pamphlet of instructions on "The Garden Culture of the Rose." This gives in a concise manner the principles of Rose culture in the garden.

IMPORTANT.—We ship all orders for plants immediately upon receipt. We will reserve plants for future shipment, but instructions to that effect **MUST ACCOMPANY THE ORDER.** This applies specially to plants ordered in winter.

EARLY ORDERS.—All hardy plants, like roses, hardy shrubs, carnations, verbenas, etc., should be ordered early, as soon, at least, as the ground can be worked, and we would advise it a month in advance of this time, as in most cases provision can be made for them in a sunny window for a few weeks, thus allowing time to form new working roots. Those desiring more tender plants, such as coleus, begonias, etc., would do well to divide their orders and send for the latter later in the season, after all danger from frost has passed, as few can keep tender plants indoors without injury. It would be more convenient for us to fill all at one time, *but we speak of this in the interest of the purchaser.*

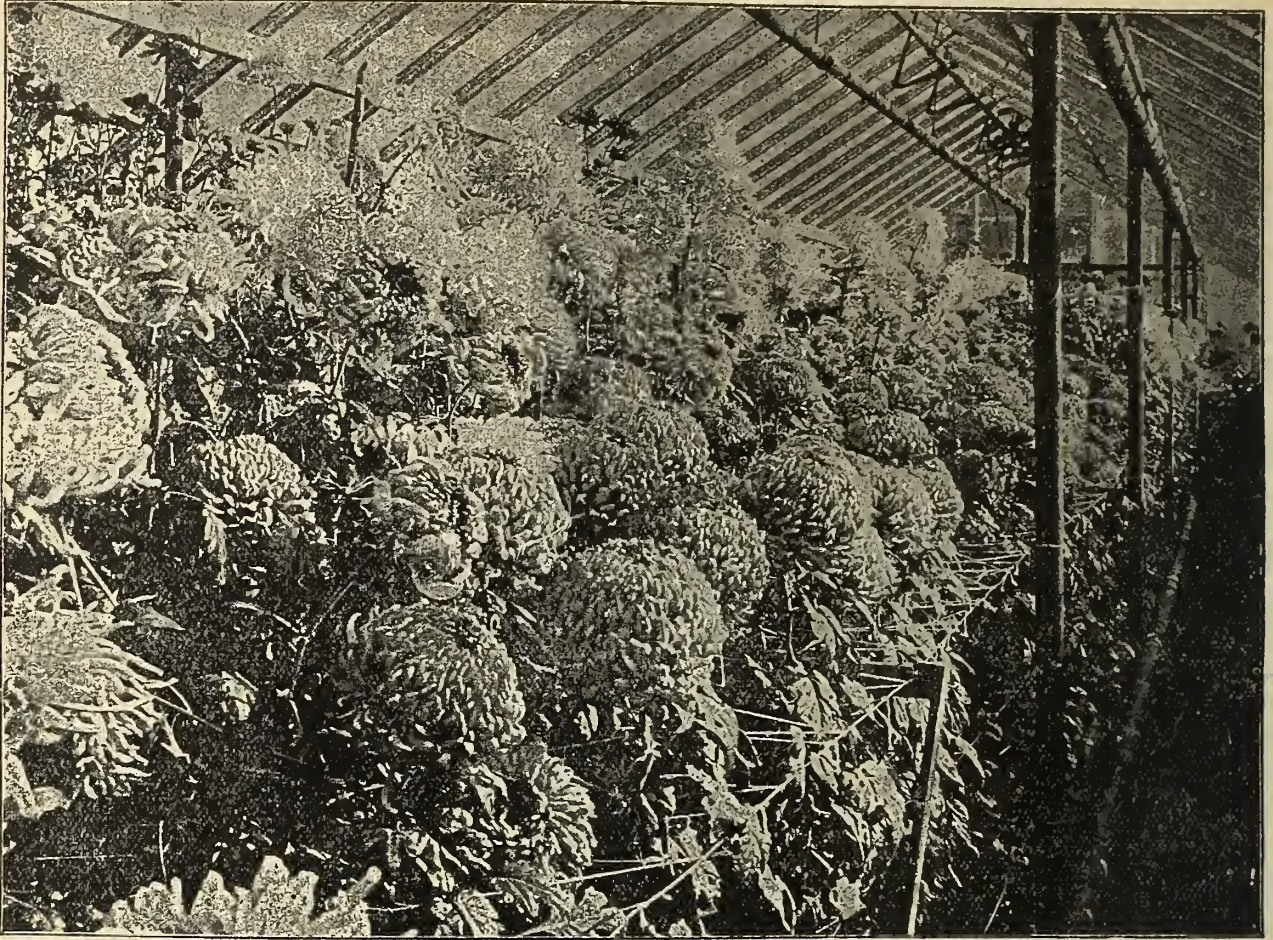


Photo of One of Our Greenhouses, Showing Flowers Grown for Exhibition Purposes.

After planting, water sparingly for a few days until the plants have taken root; after well established and showing good leaf growth, increase the amount of water. When in full growth, during hot weather, they may be watered very freely. Set the plants 18 inches apart each way, using the taller kinds for the center and dwarf kinds for the outer edge.

The most practical way to care for the roots over winter is to take up the clumps after the first killing frost, leaving some earth adhere to the roots. Place them in a dry cellar where frost will not penetrate. Do not allow the roots to become too dry, or the tubers will wither, but care should be taken that they are not too moist to allow mildewing.

Ever-Blooming Carnation Pinks.

Next to roses, pinks rank the highest in our estimation, but are supposed by many that they can not be grown and bloomed successfully outside of a green-house, when with proper treatment, which is simple enough, they may be freely bloomed out doors during the months of August, September and October. Young plants should be procured and planted as early in the spring as possible—just as soon as the ground is in a condition to work. The soil should be quite rich, well manured with thoroughly rotted manure.

To have a beautiful bed of Pinks in the fall, the plants should be planted about 10 inches apart each way; as the plants grow they should be "stopped," that is, when the shoots of growth become six inches long they should have the points pinched out. This operation should be continued until the 1st of July, when it must be discontinued if flowers are wished in August.

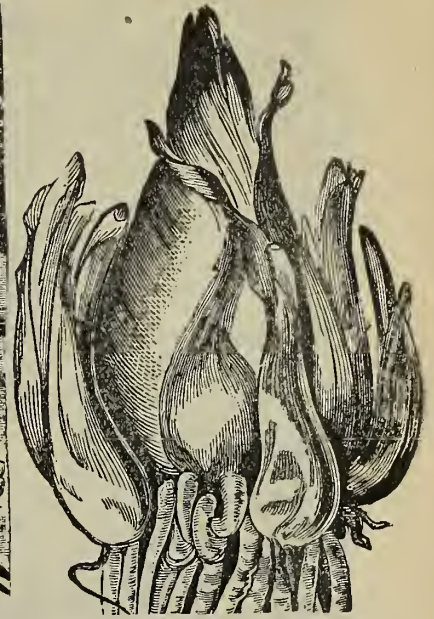

CULTURE.—They succeed in almost any soil or situation. To produce the best results they should have a rich, rather moist soil allowing each plant to have from 2 to 3 feet of space in which to develop. They will usually commence to bloom in early summer and exhaust themselves early in the fall; but if the tips are pinched out once or twice in the early summer, the bloom may be delayed until frost.

They will continue to thrive for several years, with little attention; but more vigorous growth, and consequently larger and better blooms may be had if the old clumps are taken up every two or three years and divided. This should be done in the fall, after blooming.

For the well-arranged yard, shrubbery is indispensable, for it has all the artistic advantages and all the practical ones as well. DEUTZIAS.

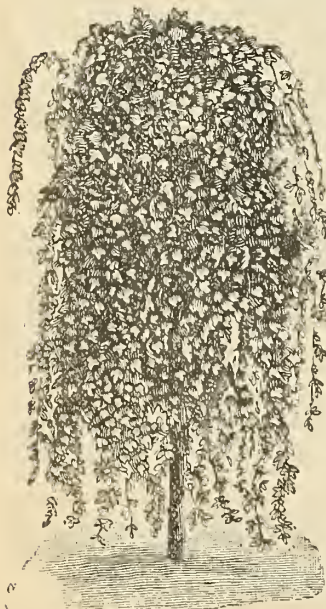

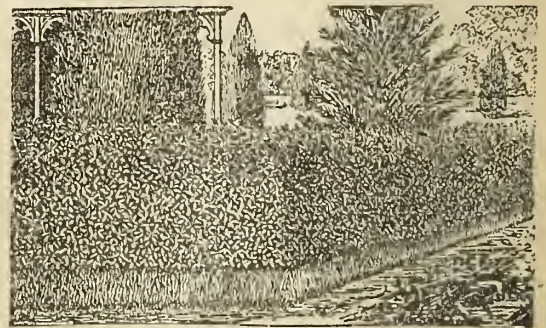

The judicious planting of ornamental trees and shrubs on the home grounds enhances the value of real estate more than an equal amount of money invested in any other way. The best time to plant deciduous trees is during the fall and spring months. In planting make the hole wide enough so that when the tree is set you can spread out the roots, always avoiding as much as possible twisting and crowding the roots. Set the tree about the same depth as it was in the nursery, which can easily be seen from the stain on the bark. Work the soil in carefully about the roots, leaving no cavities or air spaces, and pack the soil firmly. During dry seasons frequent stirring of the soil is a valuable means of retaining moisture. Be careful to see that they do not suffer from want of water during the first season; soak the ground thoroughly when it needs it.

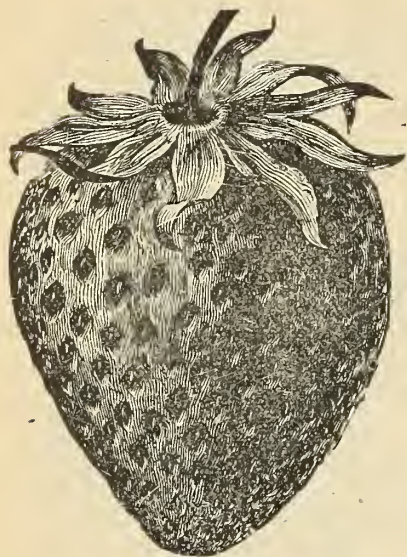

STRAWBERRIES

Strawberries will succeed in any soil that is adapted to ordinary farm or garden crops. Soil should be thoroughly prepared to a good depth, well drained and enriched. Vegetable manure (muck, rotten turf, wood soil, ashes, etc.), is the best. For field culture set in rows three and a half feet apart, fifteen to eighteen inches in rows; for garden fifteen inches apart each way, leaving pathway every third row. To produce fine, large fruit, keep in hills, pinching runners off as soon as they appear. Ground should always be kept clean and well cultivated. In winter a covering of leaves, straw or some kind of litter will protect the plants. Do not cover them until ground is frozen or so deep as to smother the plants, and remove covering before growth starts in spring. Mulching will keep the fruit clean and the soil in good condition through the fruiting season.

The blossoms of those marked (p) are destitute of stamens, and are termed pistillate, and unless a row of perfect flowering variety is planted at intervals not exceeding about a rod, they will produce imperfect fruit and but little of it, but when properly fertilized, as a rule, they are more prolific than those with perfect flowers.

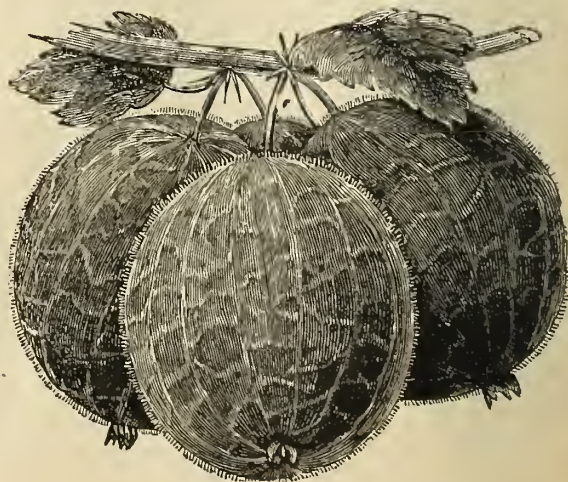

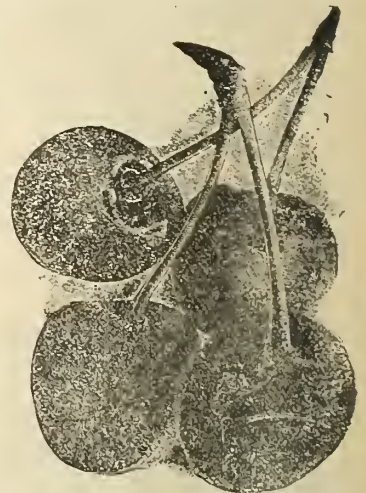

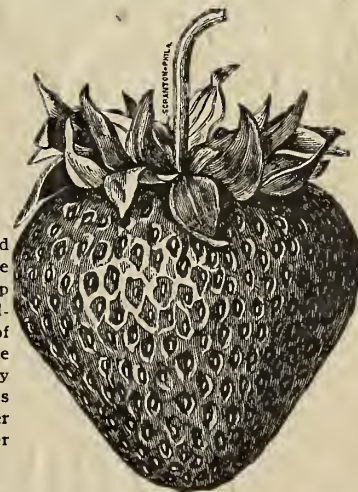
TRIUMPH—Large, yellow nearly covered with red; flesh bright yellow, free when fully ripe, and of excellent flavor. Ripens in August.
